CAP

Hello, I'm Christiane Cook and I am Church Wigan's Christians Against Poverty (CAP)'s Debt Centre Manager. Through Wigan Deanery Trust we have been partnering with Christians Against Poverty (www.capuk.org) for nearly 2 years and have seen £167,000 of debt taken off Wigan CAP clients so far. We have seen hope restored in their lives, isolation reduced and new



friendships made - realising CAP's vision to see transformed lives, thriving churches, and an end to UK poverty. CAP works through local churches to offer in-depth support and holistic care, which is free for clients and paid for by extensive fundraising and the generosity of people in Wigan.

Low income and struggles with mental health are the two biggest reasons our clients are finding themselves in unmanageable debt, but the ongoing rise in the cost of living continues to pile on pressure in situations that are already difficult enough. People often don't know where to turn for help and before we, their local church stepped in, 49% of clients who responded to our survey had considered suicide as a way out of debt. This heartbreakingly high figure continues to be a stark reminder that poverty takes more than people's possessions or money: it steals their very lives.

It is an absolute privilege to visit clients with a befriender (CAP trained volunteers) and see hope restored that here may be a way out of debt. The first step is often the hardest, which is to contact CAP to book an appointment on caphelp.org or by calling our helpline team on 0800 328 0006.

Highfield Cricket Club

All at Highfield are delighted to hear that Billy Boston has become Sir Billy! Billy was back on his old stomping ground at Highfield just last year celebrating our club's centenary. He was a fearsome fast bowler for Highfield during the 1950s and early 1960s.

Highfield made the short journey to Orrell in the latest round of league fixtures. Ryan Hargreaves won the toss for the visitors and chose to bowl first on a wicket that appeared to help the bowlers. The opening partnership of Mohit and Sam Rotherham quickly got about their work, and the India professional struck early on, cleaning up Heeley. Mahoney and Pallett looked to dig in against miserly bowling, taking the score to 35 before Mohit claimed his second wicket. Rotherham then snared Pallett and Bala bowled captain Baybutt round his legs, but Wareing and Hurst added 50 for the 5th wicket.

At 100 for 4, the home side would have been looking to set Highfield a competitive score with fewer overs in the game to chase them, but the returning Mohit and Bala saw things otherwise, claiming the last 6 wickets between them, Orrell dismissed for 121 in the 52nd over reflecting the quality of Highfields bowling and the conditions, albeit the visitors missed quite a few chances that would have helped reduce the target further. Bala 5 for 29 off 12 overs and Mohit 4 for 25 off 17. Orrell opened their bowling with the slow left arm spin of their Sri Lankan professional Jayalath and seam from Aggrey. With scoring having proven difficult for the home side, it was a good start from Highfield, adding 32 for the first wicket before Welsby was adjudged 1bw.

Hargreaves had dominated the partnership but he was next out for an important 36 runs, misjudging a shorter ball from Jayalath and pulling it straight to mid-wicket. At 68 for 2, Michael Simpson and Jamie Darbyshire appeared to have broken the back of the run chase, but both Darbyshire and the in-form Bala were quickly back in the pavilion, 75 for 4.

Simpson remained steadfast and received good support from a watchful Mohit as they eaked out runs towards the target. Mohit then edged Heeley to slip, 90 for 5 and the required rate at 3 runs an over in a game where every run was celebrated. Harry Moxham relaxed the huge travelling support from Highfield with a couple of boundaries but he too perished, leaving Simpson and ex first team skipper James Taylor needing 20 to secure a win, with 3 other batsmen still in the tent. The finish was tense for the large gallery, and a couple of streaky fours helped the visitors cause, but there was nothing streaky about Taylors (14) pull over midwicket for four against the otherwise miserly Jayalath as Highfield homed in on the win with Simpson batting heroically for a near 100 ball 28 unbeaten runs, a great effort.

Highfield needed 46 overs to claim victory but that they did, winning by 4 wickets and claimed 20 points against the home sides 4 points.

Ryan Hargreaves reflections on the game:

"Great team performance to get over the line away at Orrell. Still plenty to work on, but to get the win was a great feeling. Fielding was very average in the first half but all the bowlers did the job for us, Mohit and Sam, Mohit back to his best and Sam seriously unlucky to come away with just one. Once again, the spinners came on to keep the momentum. Great

spell from Bala but all bowlers bowled to their strengths and did really well.

Second half, the message was simple, let's bat as long as needed and get the win with no dramas but we have got to do it the Highfield way and make it harder than it should've been. Hats off to Mike Simpson, who stuck to his task with a match winning effort and Jimmy T with a crucial knock as well, guiding us over the winning line.

Highfield 2nd XI welcomed Southport Trinity to Billinge Road.

Only one change from last week's team. Jordan Callinan is away exploring Europe and in came U15 William Heyes on his second team debut.

Losing the toss, Southport elected to bat on a hard deck which pleased Highfield who were happy to bowl with the overcast conditions on offer. Opening the bowling Matty Wallace and Charlie Farrell kept it tight for the first 10 overs without initially finding a breakthrough with Southport 27-0. The first breakthrough came in the 16th over with Lee Martinus bowling the opening batsman for 21. Matty Wallace backed this up in the very next over edging to Lee Martinus at first slip with the ball eventually sandwiched between his torso and hand, laid flat on his back as Lee (to everyone's surprise) kept hold of it!! With bowing tight, but not many wickets falling, Southport found themselves 102-2 from 33 overs. A real batting collapse which included a landmark Matty Wallace hat trick and some aggressive field placements, saw Southport all out for 130 losing 8 wickets for just 28 runs.

Opening the batting, Tom Cunliffe and Javid Ahmad Niazi again got the squirrels off to a good start 40-0 from the first 10 overs. This didn't change as the pair were running excellently between the wickets, turning regulation singles into twos more often than not and putting the bad ball away. Both batsmen reached well deserved half centuries in their century plus stand, both scoring 61. Highfield easily chased the total down within 29 overs only losing Niazi in the process.

A great win for the 2nd XI and a much-needed maximum 25 points and with other results going our away, pushes us 3 places up the table.

Alongside the ever popular Allstars programme, attracting around 50 youngsters this year, we are also running our first ever coaching programme for girls only. The girls are having a great time at their weekly Dynamos Cricket sessions. **Gary Speakman**

Jesus could help such a man. And so He appeared to him and the other disciples. Instead of scolding him, Jesus simply showed him the wounds. Thomas's response was immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20.26ff). Ancient legends tell how Thomas went on to India as a missionary. There are rumours that Thomas even built a palace for a king's daughter in India, and thus he is the patron saint of architects. It is believed that he was martyred by a spear on 3rd July, 72 AD in Mylapore, near Madras. 46 ancient churches in England are dedicated to him.

Wardens Corner

Summer is here usually a period when life slows down a little and we take a break from some of our regular activities. We've just had our annual meeting when we looked back on the previous year and looked forward to the next one.



This year we're going to be asked by Church Wigan to carry out an in depth review of all of the life of our parish; this follows on from last year's Right Buildings review.

Below is an extract from a report by the Team Rector (Neil Cook) to the Toint Council

"Right Buildings. 2024 was a crucial year of decision following a thorough review of every church building in Church Wigan, with six being recommended for release. While painful, this difficult process was conducted with empathy and faith at every level and will be followed up with regular reflection on sustainability each October, starting 2025.

He went on to explain the aims of the review

"'Joyful sustainability' occurs when our resources (people, money, and buildings) are sufficient and aligned to fulfil our Godgiven mission in a way that blesses people rather than burning them out. It is the way of the easy yoke, not the crushing burden. Our long-term goal is that we engage in a level of God-led ministry which we can sustain without constant risk of burnout - it's about what we can do in Christ, not what we can' t.'

The best way to avoid burn out is to have more people each doing less. It really is enjoyable and fulfilling to be a part of a team working together, so long as we're not stretching ourselves too far.

Over the summertime, please pray for the clergy and PCC as we discern what our unique mission is in God's plan, then we will be able to be more specific about where help is needed, and you will all be able to see where you might fit in.
