

May we be ready to sow seeds of the Gospel, to nurture them with prayer, and to rejoice when they bear fruit.

So this October, may your heart be full of gratitude. May your hands be open in generosity. And may your spirit be renewed by the God who gives us every good gift.

Our menu features delicious homemade soups that warm the soul, jacket potatoes with a variety of mouthwatering fillings, and the



occasional "Special", there are also toasties and of course our freshly baked scones and cakes that pair perfectly with a cup of tea or coffee, plus a range of snacks that round out the offerings, alongside a selection of hot and cold drinks.

### St. Matthew's Churchyard Team

I am asked by Pauline Glover, one of the longest serving members of our team to express her thanks to all those kind people who regularly buy the home grown (and beautifully sweet) tomatoes from her own greenhouse. All the money she raises from this is given to a fund supporting the expenses of our Graveyard maintenance team. Over the past two and a half years she has donated in excess of £600



to our fund. Last year she personally paid for a £250 Stihl strimmer to add to our equipment. It must also be said that Margaret McCourty from the choir also did the same. I expect problems with Margaret for telling you this as she much prefers to remain anonymous. However, I am a firm believer in giving credit where and to whom it is due.



Our Church Treasurer, Jeff is also very much on the ball in helping with funds for this purpose. In August I bought £125 worth of fuel for our seven strimmers. It was paid back into my account the same day. We try to avoid excessive use of church funds where at all possible, but occasional usage is inevitable. We would also be remiss in not mentioning again the

Cricket Club for allowing the use of one of their tractor mowers to mow the graveyard, at absolutely no cost to church, they even refuse payment for the fuel used. The actual driver of the mower is the only person who is paid for his work. (But that is part of his job.) Finally, it would be impossible to let this occasion pass without again thanking our Community Interest Club (Our Parish Hall). They have spent in excess of £800 stocking our storeroom with every type of tool necessary to do our work and are always receptive to requests for further assistance, so many thanks to the Committee. (They are all our own people).

I started this article by referring to Pauline and it is only right that I finish on the same subject. She has already this year raised and donated  $\pounds250$  with her tomatoes, some of which has already been spent on additional equipment, as well as decorating around church with her home-grown plants and daffodils in spring. The grass surrounding the cherry trees in front of the church car park has also been liberally sprinkled with thousands of wildflower seeds by

her and we look forward to a lovely display next year. It also must be said that Tohn Dawson and I would be totally unable to do this work without the assistance of the people of the parish. I confess that I tend to advertise our meetings on Facebook and the results have been fantastic. From our original team of half a dozen rapidly ageing volunteers who have been struggling for years to do the job, (some of us started 40 years ago), we now have up to 20 people who turn up on request from all over Highfield and Winstanley. I confess that I tend to hobble around with my stick supervising', looking busy, but actually doing very little! We only meet for two hours bi-weekly, but those numbers can do



an awful lot in two hours and all for a bacon butty from Janet. Our church ladies, Sheila, Elizabeth, Jean and Julie also come to 'brew up' for the workers and all visitors to the graveyard.

We are one happy gang of people, and it must be said there are representatives of a number of other denominations who also help us regularly, as well as non-churchgoers doing their bit for the community. We are very grateful.




When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about His current place of residence: "where are you staying"

### **Wardens Corner**

I'm writing this month's update, in the middle of September however I was horrified to see yesterday that Mince Pies have already appeared in the shops! I have been looking back over the summer, and I hope you enjoyed a break from normal routine at



some point. Parents I hope you appreciate the peace that came back into your homes when school started again. Although some of our regular organisations have had a break during August, some of the volunteers were 'deployed' into different roles such as, providing free food for families at least once a week in one or other of our venues. The food provided is mainly paid for by grants from different charities, but of course these must be applied for, which also requires work. So, a big thank you to all those teams.

Speaking of grants, St Paul's has received a total of £19,000 from Age Partnership

The money is being used primarily to provide disabled access to S
Paul's Church, in the form of ramps to be put in place at the South Door (already in place) and at the back of the building

(still in the planning stage). This means that a greater variety of community groups will be able to access the large meeting room at the east end of the church. The grant also provided a new cooker for St Paul's Hall to help with providing food every week for Wellspring families and for Friends together once a month. These events feed at least 50 people each time, so a professional cooker is very welcome.

The leadership team of our parish have become aware that we are losing touch with some members who are no longer able to get to church. Could I please encourage you, if you know of someone in this situation who would like a visit, to speak to someone in church, talk to someone you know who goes to church or contact us by calling our parish administrator Barbara Poyntz 07881 792451. Be assured that she will arrange for someone from your church or worshipping community to get back to you. If it is not urgent, please leave a message on the answer machine. If your need IS urgent, you can contact one of the leaders of your worshipping community directly. Their numbers are all listed inside the back page of the magazine.
