As we begin March, the days are lengthening and soon the hours of daylight will be longer than the hours of darkness. We are also about to enter the season of Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday, on 5 March.

The origins of the word 'Lent' come from the old English word *lencten*, which means 'springtime', 'spring', and the Germanic word *langitinaz*, which means 'lengthening', so it is a word that is richly symbolized by the signs of new life that we see

emerging during the season of spring: spring flowers, new-born lambs, baby chicks, and Easter eggs, to name but a few. The church uses these symbols of new life to remind us of the hope that is ours through the new life won for us by the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Lent is the 40-day period (excluding Sundays) that starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Easter Saturday. Its purpose is to help us to prepare to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, at Easter. This is the most important event in the Christian calendar. It is a time when we make time to draw closer to God. We may do this through fasting, or giving something up, and through making time for prayer, reflection and reading the Bible.

The Church of England's Lent theme for 2025 is Living Hope:

In Lent we journey with Jesus on the difficult and thorny road that leads all the way to the cross on Good Friday - and beyond, to the transformation of Easter Day.

God invites us to bring to him our own journey through everyday life. In the disappointment of daily setbacks and the pain of deeper hurts, we discover that God is present with us. And God promises a future where all things are healed and made new.

Living Hope offers us the opportunity to deepen our hope in God and be part of what God is doing to bring hope in the world.

How can you get involved?

You can read and listen to daily Lent reflections from 5 March through the *Everyday Faith* app, the new daily devotional app from the Church of England, which is available to download here: https://www.churchofengland.org/faith-life/exploring-faith/everyday-faith

If you would like a challenge, we would also like to encourage to read the New Testament of the Bible during Lent. If you can commit just 20 to 30 minutes a day, over 40 days, you can do this. We have included a Bible reading programme in the centre of this magazine to help you to do this.

Accessing a Bible

Many years ago, whist setting up the Church for a communion service being led by Rev Sam Pratt. I remember a comment Sam passed in general conversation

"A good Christian should always carry a Bible with them."

And me thinking at that time that's not always practical in all situations or walks of life.

Well, a few years ago I came to realise that I was complying with Sam's opinion which gave me a very self-satisfying feeling, (not quite a halo above the head) but to me it was an achievement.

This became possible when mobile phones became smart phones (minicomputers) and I had downloaded two versions of the Bible onto my phone, consequently I am rarely without my phone and therefore in possession of a Bible.

The lack of pew Bibles was mentioned in a meeting a few weeks ago and I commented how easy it is to access the Bible on a mobile phone or tablet these days, so it was suggested this could make a useful article for the magazine.

My favourite version for easy accessibility is Collins Good News Bible app. Once opened you find a menu of 15 options:

- 1. The Bible 2. Timeline.
- 3. Who's who? 4. About the Bible
- 5. Introductory reading plan
- 6. Life issues 7. Quiz
- 8. Maps 9. Dictionary
- 10. Miracles of Jesus
- 11. Parables of Jesus

- 12. I need help (SOS)
- 13. Passages for occasions
- 14. Prayers from the Bible
- 15. Inspiration.

Each of these sections open other multiple choices allowing easy ways to pinpoint the information you require for example, *1. The Bible*, upon selecting this from the menu we find a scroll with a choice of index, Old Testament or New Testament or Deuterocanonical, or All, then via A-Z or Regular. After making the selection it then allows me to scroll through BOOK, CHAPTER and VERSE in which ever order I have chosen.

A page can be found quietly in seconds allowing readings to be followed or extended or researched etc etc.

Unfortunately, this version doesn't appear in my app store anymore but a very similar one is "Good News Bible GNB" along with several others very similar. Have a look, nothing lost.

There must be hundreds of other versions to download and access all of which are useful tools to promote The Gospels and all other pages using $21^{\rm st}$ century technology to give The Good News.

It also makes me realise that when I see people with their noses buried in their phones not to judge, they may be reading the BIBLE!

Happy Birthday

1825 is a long time ago! Almost 70 years before St. Matthew's Highfield Church was built in fact. Yet every week in church we have a direct connection with 200 years ago, by pure chance. In 2010 or thereabouts I was elected as Churchwarden of St. Matthew's Church, where I joined my friend and colleague Jeff McCann. We were Churchwardens during the ministry of Rev. Bob Pearson and found the positions somewhat challenging at times. People are probably unaware that Churchwardens are elected as the bishop's representative and are answerable to the bishop, not the incumbent. However, I digress!

Whilst searching the church safe one day looking for something, I came across several old offertory plates at the back. Amongst them were four worn old plates made from pewter. Now pewter is not commonly used nowadays, and was an alloy of tin, antimony, copper and occasionally silver. Old pewter however contained a lot of lead which was of course poisonous and so it became less and less popular. These plates were engraved and dated 1825. The names, presumably of two Churchwardens, probably at St. John's the Divine had been engraved on them. It would seem that they had donated them to the church and after 70 years they were probably considered surplus to requirements and donated to one of the daughter churches when it opened in 1894. That daughter church being St. Matthew's! However, there is a bit of a mystery here, since though the plates are engraved 1825; St John's church in Pemberton was only opened in 1832!

St. John's was a 'Waterloo' Church. After the Battle of Waterloo and victory over the French in June 1815, the British Government gave a sum of one million pounds to build churches in celebration. An absolute fortune in those days of course. However, if I told you that St John's cost £4500 in 1832 to build, it shows how many churches could have been built with one million! 70 years later St. Matthew's church cost Colonel Blundell £10,000 to build.

On behalf of the late Mrs. Hannah Rhodes, a cousin of my wife's, who offered to pay, I had the plates renovated and put back into use in church. There is still a bit of a mystery, however. Where were the plates used between 1825 and 1832? Put your answers on a postcard and address them to the incumbent at St. John's, Pemberton. Provider of the best answer can act as Sides person next week using the plates!

For your information if you were unaware, St. John's the Divine had four daughter churches built in the following order, St. Mark's, St. Matthew's, St. Paul's and finally St. James' in Poolstock.

Lent Fasting

After Jesus was baptised he was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. After he fasted for 40 days and 40 nights he was hungry. And then the devil came to tempt him.

We remember Jesus' fast and join him in it for the 40 days of lent. Traditionally Christians give up meat, eggs, and dairy products and use up the last of these on Shrove Tuesday by making pancakes.

How will you fast this lent?

I encourage you to do something for lent, it is a spiritual discipline that helps us prepare for the celebration of Easter-where Jesus defeats death and invites us to live forever with him.

You could give up a luxury, or your favourite food, or something that makes life that bit nicer. Perhaps cheese or coffee? Lent isn't just about giving something up, it's about being prepared for Easter. Over the page is a reading plan to read the whole of the New Testament in 40 days, Revd Fran mentioned the *Everyday Faith* daily devotional app from the Church of England, and there are many other things you can take up during lent.

Whatever you choose make sure it's something that you'll notice, and do it for the right reason.

In Isaiah chapter 58 God's people say "Why have we fasted, and you have not seen it? Why have we humbled ourselves, and you have not noticed?" God's reply is that their fast didn't change their behaviour, their fast was a ritual with no heart behind it. God says "Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter— when you see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood?"

We often think of fasting as giving something up, but it's also about taking something up. Our fasting should result in us becoming more like Jesus, and when we become more like Jesus we act more like God expects us to in Isaiah 58.

So, don't do something for lent because it's what you do every year, instead do something for lent because of your devotion to God and your desire to be closer to him.

Lent 2025 Reading Plan

Read the New Testament in 40 Days

You can spend around half an hour a day reading through the whole of the New Testament this Lent. This reading plan splits the New Testament into 40 chunks of roughly equal size.

We recommend you use a modern translation of the Bible. If you have not got a modern translation please ask anyone in leadership in West Wigan for one. You can also listen to the New Testament online, biblegateway.com offers an audio option.

- Day 1, Wednesday 5 March: Matthew chapter 1 to chapter 7.
- Day 2, Thursday 6 March: Matthew chapter 8 to chapter 12.
- Day 3, Friday 7 March: Matthew chapter 13 to chapter 18.
- Day 4, Saturday 8 March: Matthew chapter 19 to chapter 24.

Sunday is a day of rest.

- Day 5, Monday 10 March: Mathew chapter 25 to the end of Matthew.
- Day 6, Tuesday 11 March: Mark chapter 1 to chapter 7.
- Day 7, Wednesday 12 March: Mark chapter 8 to chapter 11.

THE GOSPEL OF FELLOWSHIP






