Dear friends.

Summer is here! As I sit and write this it's the first week of the summer holidays and my children have gone to stay with a grandparent, leaving the house unusually quiet. It has given me the time and space to think about the last year. Jude was in year one and Eve year four, I've watched both of them grow in knowledge, confidence, and character and it is a delight to watch them grow and a privilege to be part of their growth and development.



We understand and expect our children to grow, not just physically but we expect their heart, mind, body, and soul to mature. It would be unusual and alarming to get to the end of the academic year and not see any positive change in our children.

We should have the same expectation of positive change in our own lives and in the life of our Church. The word we use for this Christian growth is "sanctification" - the process of becoming holy, perfect, and Christ-like and it is a process that is only fully completed in the world to come.

Each of us who follow Jesus is in the process of sanctification, we become more holy over time, we imitate Jesus a little more closely as time goes by. It is good and right to expect change in our own lives and we should be able to look back over the year and see that we have grown, just like we can with our children.

As adults this can be difficult. Change for us rarely happens at the pace it does for our children, there isn't the same expectation of change, we don't have a syllabus and we don't have set achievements or qualifications to attain. However, there are ways to help.

Firstly, we need to be deliberate about wanting to be closer to God. We each need to recognise that this is what God wants for us and that we need to do it. Jesus said "I have come that you may have life and have it to the full" (John 10:10), and everything else Jesus said first with this. Doing what Jesus tells us to do goes hand-in-hand with living life to the full. We don't engage in sanctification as a religious observance for which we receive a reward later, we do it because the God who made us set this out as the best way for us to live.

We also need to have an idea of how we grow, and for this I'm going to use the Diocese of Liverpool's Rule of Life:

• **Pray.** This is the first step in your journey, connecting with God through prayer.

- Read. Reading scripture is encouraged as a way to learn from God's word.
- Learn. Learning from God and from others is a key part of spiritual growth.
- Tell. Sharing the good news of Jesus with others is part of the journey.
- Serve. Serving those in need, both locally and globally, is a vital aspect of discipleship.
- Give. Giving back to God through time, talents, and resources is encouraged.

Help is available for each of these points, you are not on this journey alone. You can visit the Rule of Life website for more information here: ruleoflife.org.uk and you can ask any church leader for help and advice.

Another key aspect is accountability—people close to us who can nudge us in the right direction when we need it. Small groups are good for this, and are something we would like to see more of. A small group is a few people meeting regularly, often in a home, to pray, read and learn together. If you would like to be part of a small group please speak to a church leader, or talk to a couple of friends about starting one. Our faith is not meant to be lived alone, we are encouraged to spend time together to spur each other on.

Let us not give up the habit of meeting together, as some are doing. Instead, let us encourage one another all the more, since you see that the Day of the Lord is coming nearer. Hebrews 10:25

The more we each engage in personal growth, the more we seek the Kingdom of God ourselves, then the more we will see that as a Church. We know that our Church isn't perfect, and we know that it will be perfect when Jesus returns, so we can see that the Church too is in the process of growth.

We will always share Eucharist, read the Scripture, pray, and hear preaching but exactly how we do this, and what else we do as Church, and how we're engaging with people in our neighbourhoods, should change and grow.



A SPLASH OF COURAGE: MY 65TH BIRTHDAY SWIM IN WINDERMERE








Since the sad loss of our lovely 'Buddy' in January we decided to become Puppy Raisers for Guide Dogs rather than get a new pup of our own (for now!).

Would I be fit enough? Could I handle the cold? This year, with my 65th birthday looming and our commitment to Guide Dogs growing, I decided it was now or never. Sponsoring the swim for such a meaningful cause gave me the extra push to take the plunge.





The afternoon of June 13 arrived, crisp and clear. As I stood on the shore of Windermere, the lake stretched out before me, its surface glinting under the early summer sun. My nerves were electric, but so was my excitement. The group of swimmers, a mix of seasoned veterans and first-timers like me, shared a camaraderie that eased my jitters. We waded in together, the cold-water biting at first but soon giving way to exhilaration. Stroke by stroke, I found my

Back on shore, my merry band of supporters greeted me with hugs and cheers, their pride and relief matching my own. It was a celebration not just of my birthday, but of courage, community, and the power of giving back.

As I reflect on that day, I'm filled with gratitude. Swimming in Windermere was a dream realized, a challenge met, and a chance to support a cause that is now an even bigger part of our lives – our boy Morgan our Guide dog puppy – arrived 4 weeks ago we are absolutely delighted with him!

Where is this year going? August is here again and very soon we will be seeing Christmas decorations up. I confess to being somewhat of a wet blanket when it comes to those. However, I suppose we do have nearly five months to live and hopefully enjoy before then! I certainly hope that members of our Friendship Group will have enjoyed a few more trips and meals out in that period.

In July we discussed our next trip. We are strictly an equal opportunity group, inasmuch as everyone has a right to express their opinion on where we should go and in the case of disagreements, we vote on the issues, with the most votes winning the day. This was exactly how a decision was made on this occasion. The options put forward by me were to go once again to either Llandudno, Lytham, or to Knowsley Safari Park. With the additional options of having a meal at the Fox at Roby Mill, or at the Wheatlea Park restaurant near to the M6 slip road.

The first two would require the hiring of a coach at a cost of £500, the others we could go in our own vehicles. This support has been given for several years now and hopefully it will continue. In addition to that, last year I was successful in obtaining a further grant of £500 from another Community Fund, this particular amount was considerably added to by our own Community Interest Club (the Parish Hall) and together we financed a post-Christmas party in the Hall for ALL volunteers in St. Matthew's Parish. You would probably be amazed at how many local people give up their time to help others in all sorts of ways, from the church choir, church cleaners, graveyard maintenance helpers, Youth Leaders etc., plus of course their spouses. We catered for up to 100 people, including our Group, for a pleasant evening with entertainment in early January in our Community Hall. Something else that we hope to do again.

Anyhow, I have omitted to mention the winner of the vote. We will be going once again to Llandudno, together with regular friends who pay for one of the considerable numbers of spare seats on the 37-seater coach. Those who wish to can also join those of us happy to pay for a pleasant lunch in the 4* St. George's Hotel on the promenade or do whatever else takes their fancy. I can only hope for the beautiful weather we enjoyed last time. Dave Whitter

On the field, all of our junior teams are having strong seasons. Congratulations to the under 11s team coached by Lahiru Wellalage ("Bala") who won a tight playoff game against Leigh to secure the League Pairs Trophy. Well done boys and girls, and Bala and his helpers.

In the latest round of league matches for the senior teams, we enjoyed a double header win against Old Xaverians.

Highfield hosted Old Xaverians CC from Liverpool in the latest round of league matches. The visitors won the toss and unsurprisingly chose to bat on a baking hot day at Billinge Road with a lightning-fast outfield. Old Xavs started well with a solid opening partnership before Mohit Jangra struck, Chris McLoughlin taking the slip catch. But the innings was 17 overs old when Jangra claimed his second, clean bowling the other opener, 55 for 2. Hedley Molyneux replaced Sam Rotherham, but seam at that end quite quickly made way for spin in the form of Jamie Darbyshire. Meanwhile Jangra toiled away and did claim a third wicket, breaking a stubborn partnership, 77 for 3. Darbyshire also claimed a wicket, but at 132 for 4, the visitors were well placed to post a competitive score. But as so many times this season, the prolific wicket taker Bala struck, and triggered a series of dismissals that saw Old Xavs all out for 180. Bala added another five-wicket haul to his collection, whilst Mohit claimed 4.

Highfields openers Joel Welsby and captain Ryan Hargreaves started well before Hargreaves played a trademark cut straight to slip, 30 for 1. Welsby was undeterred by losing his opening partner and with good support from Mike Simpson, moved to an excellent 50 before being bowled, 87 for 2. Simpson (18) also followed and when Bala was dismissed for just 4, the home side were 104 for 4. But Highfield have strength in the batting order and resilience. And so it proved as Hedley Molyneux and Harry Moxham made light work of the target, Moxham blazing a run a ball unbeaten 28 and Molyneux a similarly paced unbeaten 61, including 3 maximums.

25 points for Highfield and a further push up the table as the promotion places tighten up a bit more.

Highfield 2s travelled to South Liverpool to face Old Xaverians on a hot summer's day. Ryan Allen won the toss, and it was to no surprise to put the opposition into the field and bat first. Adding to his tally, he quickly found 2 more wickets, the score 37-3. Young Charlie Farrell picked up a well-deserved wicket with the other opening batsmen hitting the ball to Jack Cunliffe at cover. First change Lee Martinus 'steaming' into the crease, joined the party, picking up a wicket hitting leg stump of the middle order batsmen. Matty Wallace reached another 5-wicket haul, snicking the batsmen to veteran Gary Darbyshire along with another textbook bowled. With the score at 70-8 from 20 overs, Highfield looked to wrap things up and get out of the sun. But Old Xaverians had other ideas with an unexpected 10th wicket partnership of 69 runs.



The Transfiguration

The story of the Transfiguration is told in


Matthew (17:1–9), Mark (9:1–9) and Luke (9:28–36). On that day, high up on a mountain, Peter, James and John were given a glimpse of Jesus' true glory. For Jesus' face began to shine as the sun, and his garments became white and dazzling. Then Elijah and Moses, suddenly appeared, talking with him.

Overwhelmed, Peter offered to build three tabernacles on that holy place, one for each. But God's 'tabernacling', or God's dwelling with mankind, does not any longer depend upon building a shrine. It depends on being in the presence of Jesus, instead. And so a bright cloud covered them, and a voice spoke, saying that Jesus was his beloved son, whom the disciples should 'hear'. God's dwelling with mankind depends upon our listening to Jesus.

Why did Moses and Elijah appear? They represent the Law and the Prophets of the Old Covenant, or Old Testament. But now they were handing on the baton, if you like: for both the Law and the Prophets found their final fulfilment in Jesus, the Messiah.


