As I write this article the sun is shining, we've have had a few weeks of sunshine and most of the people I meet reflect that in their attitude most feel good but I have had a couple of moans "It's too hot". It reminds me of the different seasons in the Christian year. Lent, a time of reflection taking us to Gethsemane and Good Friday then to that glorious acclamation "Alleluia Christ is Risen" "He is risen indeed, Alleluia". We see in the gospels the followers of Jesus travel that same journey for the first time. Gethsemane, Good Friday, Easter Day. What a journey for them, mind



blowing after that first Easter Day. They spend time with the risen Jesus, the first thing he tells them is to wait: Acts 1 verse 4 "Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about." Wait for how long? And for what gift? They didn't know. We do they waited forty days for the gift of the Holy Spirit. In John chapter 7 verses 37, 38 & 39 John tells us about receiving that gift.

On the last and greatest day of the festival, Jesus stood and said in a loud voice, "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." By this he meant the Spirit, whom those who believed in him were later to receive. Up to that time the Spirit had not been given, since Jesus had not yet been glorified.

John is writing this in hindsight (*Spirit had not been given, since Jesus had not yet been glorified*) John tells us three things we need to be ready to receive the person of God's Holy Spirit in our lives.

1 We must **Thirst.** If we are dying of thirst the only thing we can think about is quenching that thirst. Jesus says here if you're dying spiritually if you are spiritually thirsting then come to me and drink. It's about constantly coming to Jesus and drinking his love.

2 We must **Believe in Jesus** "Alleluia Christ is Risen" We become Easter People. The old has gone the new has come (2 Corinthians 5:17). Rivers of living water flow from Easter People, the water that quenches all spiritual thirsting.

3 Jesus must be **Glorified**, that happened historically at the ascension Jesus took his place on the throne that had been prepared for him. We also need to put Jesus on the throne of our hearts, to do that we must make room for him on that throne by taking ourselves off it.

In the 40 days between the resurrection and the ascension this is what the followers of Jesus did - they thirsted, quenching that

thirst listening and learning from Jesus. That led them to believe in Jesus. That belief made them want to give all the glory to Jesus and live for him not themselves. Proclaiming not just with their mouths but with their lives "Alleluia Christ is Risen".

They became Easter People not people working for the Lord but people allowing the Lord to work through them. Are we Easter People? Do we thirst? Do we believe? Do we glorify Jesus? Are streams of living water flowing through us? Are we ready for all the Holy Sprit wants

God knows what is 'good' for us

'All things work together for good to those who love God…who are the called according to His purpose.' Romans 8:28

Carolyn Arends writes: 'Our expectations are not just unrealistic, they' re anti-gospel…Many of us…distort His promise of abundant life into something that resembles the illusion advertisers sell us every day. How do we resist our sense of entitlement and the distorted expectations that are so deeply ingrained?

1) Check the Definitions. When I read that God "works all things together for good", I think of the marketers' definitions…that "good" means "easy", "youthful", "desirable", and "wealthy". God defines "good" in entirely different terms. New Testament Christians seemed to believe the greatest good is to become more like Jesus. They took it for granted…the process wouldn't be easy…that the "good" God is working towards is much more expansive than one individual's personal circumstances. God is establishing His kingdom… "reconciling all things to himself" (Colossians 1:20), and the ultimate good…is to be included in that process…My heavenly father knows more than I do about what I need… His definition of "blessing" is different from mine.

2) Re-evaluate Death: I can point to "dead ends" in my career, or relationships that turned out to be opportunities to change direction. When I think of the energy I've expended resisting endings, I wonder what new life I've missed. Jesus tells us to die so we can live…to surrender all the illusions about what makes a life good…And then He walks with us…as we die a thousand deaths in the process of letting His life go deeper…into us.'

What further change might we see in our own lives, our worship communities and our town?

So as we celebrate Pentecost, let's not let this moment pass unnoticed. Let's pray for fresh renewal, listen for God's voice, and take bold steps toward the life He's calling us to. The Spirit is moving-are we ready to follow?

Highfield Cricket Club

Highfield have now started their cricket season, with three new captains at the helm. Ryan Hargreaves is the first team skipper, Ryan Allen the seconds and Jack Cunliffe the thirds. The junior teams have also had a positive start to the season, whilst the ever -popular Allstars starts in mid-May along with a very first training and match provision designed for girls only. It's early days with just three games played for each of the senior teams, but already there have been positive and encouraging performances.

In round 3 of the league games, Highfield first team hosted Lytham on a glorious day at Billinge Road. Skipper Ryan Hargreaves elected to bat first and after losing Joel Welsby early on, forged a strong near 50 run partnership with Mike Simpson (38). Hargreaves (30) fell to Subaru, but Jamie Darbyshire (21) continued the good work, the pair moving the score pas t the 100 mark. A flurry of wickets, including a couple for ex Lancashire skipper Steven Croft, saw Highfield at 116 for 5, but Bala and Harry Moxham pushed with a decisive 90 run partnership. Moxham was dismissed for 31, with Oliver Jump (23) then providing support for Bala who scored a magnificent unbeaten 88 off just 64 balls, with 12 boundaries and 2 maximums. Highfield declared at 250 for 6 off 55 overs. Sam Rotherham and Mohit Jangra then got about their business with the ball, keeping things tight whilst chipping away at the batting order. Rotherham claimed the first two wickets including Croft, 19 for 2, and when Mohit clean bowled the Lytham keeper, the home side could sense a possible victory. The opposing captain Norris (39) offered some resistance but the spin twins of Darbyshire and Bala again worked their magic, claiming the remaining 7 wickets between them. Lytham dismissed for 109 in 34 overs, a big victory for Highfield and a maximum 25-point haul to push them up the league and within touching distance of the early leaders.

Highfield 2nd XI made the short trip to local rivals Orrell looking to get their first win of the season under the belt. Highfield lost the toss and were put into the field to bowl on a lovely sunny afternoon. Opening bowlers Charlie Farrell and Jordan Callinan both bowling tight restricted Orrell's scoring early on. Mirroring that hard work, young Henry Jones picked up a wicket with his very first snicking the opening batsmen to Lee Martinus at first ball. slip. Some good ground fielding throughout the afternoon made Orrell work hard for every run with wickets falling. After having Orrell 146-9, the last wicket partnership got Orrell to 177-9 in the 45th over picking up the final batting point and declaring. Wickets were spread all around with Charlie Farrell picking up 3, Jordan Callinan 2, Henry Jones 2, and debutant Javid Ahmad Niazi 2. After topping up on water and SPF 50, opening batsmen Steve Atkinson and Tom Cunliffe looked to get off to a strong start in the Highfield run chase. Steve Atkinson was unfortunate to go in

the 4th over after snicking to 2nd slip with a one-handed grab. In at 3, Javid Ahmad Niazi was finding the gaps and rotating strike well with Tom Cunliffe (a solid contribution of 30) with some good quick running between the wickets.

Losing quick wickets in succession, Highfield were at 79-5 with the game in the balance and all results possible. Captain Rvan Allen hitting occasional boundaries in the middle order and top scoring with 50, tried to keep hands on a possible win or at worst case a draw, but he eventually snicked off to the wicket keeper. With 7 overs left to play out and the final wicket, it was a nail bitter with experienced Gary Darbyshire and Lee Martinus ensuring a draw was on the cards and saw out the remaining overs. Highfield 3XI hosted the last year's champions Little Lever hoping to get their first win of the season. Highfield won the toss and elected to bat first, looking to set a solid total and the main objective being making use of our full 40 overs. Jack Cunliffe and Aban Abbott opened the batting and made a strong start adding 72 for the first wicket before Abbott was give out lbw. Cunliffe soon followed for 44 picking out the man in the deep. Debutant Moorthi Wannaku and young Finn Willis made good starts before also being dismissed.

At this point the scoring had slowed down and a few quick wickets fell which put the visitors in control. This was before Gary McIntyre entered the fray and batted excellently for his knock of 40. Daniel Purcell and Thomas Berkeley added some key runs at the end to give us a good total of 178-8 off our 40 overs. Tom Preston, returning for the first time in two years got us off to a flyer with the ball clean bowling the Little Lever opener in his first over. The visitors started to get back on top however, with a stand of 57 for the second wicket, Highfield knew they needed a breakthrough.

Cunliffe turned to young left arm spinner Finn Willis who bowled with control and with great effectiveness taking 4 wickets, including the two-set batsman, keeper Jack Hope with a good high catch. Dan Purcell also got a big wicket at a crucial stage of the game, he too bowling extremely well. Gary McIntyre and Jack Kendall both bowled brilliantly while the spinners did the damage at the other end. The visitors needed 20 runs and had two wickets in hand until opening bowler Charlie Farrell was brought back to try and find a way through. He took the final two wickets to win the game for the squirrels by 10 runs in a thrilling contest.

Highfield get their first win on the board after a fabulous team effort, fighting until the very end to ensure victory. **G a r y**




