The next verse [Isaiah 40:9] goes on to say, "lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear".

The value each of us brings to our respective communities is far more than just ourselves, for we are each part of something greater. We are the family of God, sisters and brothers of Jesus, and we can shine his light out into the world without fear.

Highfield Cricket Club

At the time of writing, the senior and junior teams are just days away from their first games of the season, with the ground looking in great condition due to the hard work of the grounds team throughout the winter. But unexpectedly we have a late change in the first team captaincy. Ryan Hargreaves is the new elected captain of Highfield first team for the imminent season, succeeding Mike Farrell who has decided to step down. Ryan has played at Highfield from being in our under 9s through all the age groups and has been an established first team player since his teenage years.

Ryan said: "I' m really proud to be given the opportunity to be club captain for this season. It's of course sad to see Mike deciding not to continue this year but everyone totally understands his reasoning, an absolute legend of the club and I'm sure everyone wishes him well. Cannot wait to get going with the lads this season and I am sure we can make it a successful and exciting one ... see you all down at Billinge Road soon" Mike Farrell said: "After playing for Highfield since the age of eight, I have decided to stand down as captain and spend more time with my family this summer. I feel the time is right. I will always support the club and wish Rvan all the success for the upcoming season."

With Mike Farrells decision to stand down from the captaincy and take a break from cricket, possibly permanently, it's a good time to reflect on Mikes impact on Highfield CC.

His remarkable numbers as a batsman, achievements as a captain and fielding prowess with or without the gloves, make him an all-time great player for the club. Mike has made over 500 appearances for the club scoring over 14,000 runs for Highfield, mostly in the first team at the top end of the order. Alongside over 300 catches and around 50 stumpings for the club, it might surprise some that he has also claimed 65 wickets with a best match haul of 6 for 46!! Mike started playing for Highfields junior teams around 1990 and was the overall Junior Player of the season in 1999 aged 17. He had already made his Highfield senior debut at the age of just 12 for the 3rd team in 1994, and was in the first team within 3 years, then captain by 2007. Supported by the club, he also played out in Australia in the winter of 2005

Amongst his 15 hundred's for Highfield, two have come on the last games of the season, both as captain, helping Highfield secure promotion to the Premier League. In 2009. he scored a fabulous 141 against St Helens in the final game of the season to help secure the win and promotion to the Premier League for the very first time in the clubs' history. And then for a second time in 2014. scoring 107 away against Colwyn Bay on the last day of that season, as Highfield returned to the top flight in another nail biter. Mike also spent four

seasons playing for a powerful Bootle team between 2016-2019 where he enjoyed a Premier League win and cup success in the Ray Digman and Liverpool Echo trophy. before returning to Billinge Road in 2020. As captain Mike helped secure the first teams first silverware for decades as they lifted the Ray Tyler in 2023, repeating the success last season. Reflecting his popularity amongst his teammates and of course his playing ability, Mike has won the coveted Players Player of the Year award on four occasions. Mike was deservedly awarded Honorary Life Membership of the club in 2015.

Very noticeable in large comprehensive schools!





Flight Hiding Triumph Christology Alexandria Christology This year is the 1700 anniversary of the Nicene Creed. Athanasius is the theologian behind that creed, and his feast day falls on 2 May.

Word Search

Athanasius (296-373) was born into a prosperous family in Alexandria in Egypt, and entered the ministry. He was 29 years old when he accompanied Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, to the Church's first great ecumenical Council, at Nicaea in 325. There he saw the Council debate the Person of Christ. How was He the Son of God and also Man? Did He really exist before He was born? If we worship Him, does that mean that we are worshipping two Gods?

When the heresy of Arius, which taught that Christ was not divine, and not eternal, later threatened the church, Athanasius worked with his bishop, Alexander, in framing what became known as the Nicene Creed. Our Lord's full divinity was safeguarded in the words, 'eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one substance with the Father '

For the next 45 years Athanasius' devotion, scholarship, and forceful leadership established the Nicene Creed in the Christian Church. His enemies, both in Church and state, conspired against him, and he was exiled five times from the See of Alexandria and spent a total of 17 years in flight and hiding.

Athanasius' name will always be linked with the triumph of New
