Dear Friends,

As we turn the page into February, our calendars remind us of several significant moments in the life of faith and community. St Valentine's Day often brings thoughts of love and affection, but it also offers us an opportunity to reflect on the deeper love that underpins our lives—the love of God that calls us to love one another generously and sacrificially. **"Let all that you do be done in love."** (1 Corinthians 16:14).

May the signs of spring remind us of Your promise of new life. Renew our hearts and guide our steps, that we may follow Christ faithfully through these coming weeks.

On Palm Sunday, March 29, St. Matthew's choir and friends will be performing "The Crucifixion" by John Stainer. The work was first sung at a series of special Lenten Thursday services on 24 February 1887 at Marybone Parish Church. It was first performed in the United States at St. Luke's Church, Baltimore on 3 April, 1887. Due to good press coverage it became a firm favourite with parish churches in Britain, the Empire, and the United States. The work consists of recitatives, solo numbers, choruses, and congregational hymns.

We are very lucky to have two professional singers: John Cunningham (Bass) and Stephen Newlove (Tenor) and Michael Kelsall, from St. Luke's, Orrell, as our organist.

Please come and join us on March 29<sup>th</sup> in St. Matthew's Church at 6:30 pm. It is FREE, though there will be a retiring collection!

## In Loving Memory of Fred Smith


We record with sadness the death of Fred Smith, who passed away peacefully at Dr Gray's Hospital, Elgin, on 5 January aged 81.





# Word Search

Candlemas, 2<sup>nd</sup> February, comes exactly 40 days

after Christmas. In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple (Luke 2: 22-40). So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day.

# Wardens Corner

## Light in the Darkness

Just before Christmas I was fortunate enough to enjoy a family holiday to Lapland. It was a truly memorable trip, filled with skiing, dog-sleigh rides, and of course the obligatory visit to Santa in his cosy woodland cottage.



During our visit, Santa held a question-and-answer session with around ten children. One of my grandsons, Louie, plucked up the courage to ask Santa whether he was on the naughty list. Much to his relief, Santa assured him that he was not. Another young girl then asked a very perceptive question: *what happens if you are on the naughty list?* Santa replied wisely that it was only the 18<sup>th</sup> of December and there was still plenty of time to do kind things for parents, siblings and friends before Christmas.

Listening to this exchange, I was struck by the clear parallels with the true Christmas story and the teachings of Jesus. The message of grace, forgiveness, and the opportunity to turn again towards goodness is central to our faith. As we read in Scripture, “Bear fruits worthy of repentance” (Luke 3:8), and yet we are always reminded that it is never too late to change, to act with love, and to put things right.

Another lasting impression from the trip came from our proximity to the Arctic Circle. At that time of year, there were only about two hours of daylight each day. Initially, this novelty did not trouble me, but by the end of the week the lack of light began to affect my mood. It is sobering to learn that suicide rates in such regions are statistically higher than in places closer to the equator, where daylight is more plentiful.

Once again, the Christian parallels were unmistakable. Jesus tells us, “I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life” (John 8:12).

Experiencing prolonged darkness made me reflect deeply on how vital light is—not just physically, but spiritually and emotionally. The coming of Christ at Christmas is the coming of light into a dark world, a light that overcomes despair, fear and hopelessness.

As we move through the winter months, may we remember that we are called to reflect that light ourselves—through kindness, forgiveness and love—so that others may glimpse something of Christ’s hope
